Summary: State Telecom Equity in Funding Act

STATE TELECOM EQUITY IN FUNDING ACT

Act 181, the State Telecom in Equity Funding Act, was signed by Governor Haley on May 25, 2016, and took effect immediately. The Act modifies the South Carolina Universal Service Fund ("SC USF"), the Dual Party Relay Fund ("DPRF"), and certain statutory provisions related to stand-alone basic residential telephone lines. The Act requires the Interim Local Exchange Carrier Fund ("Interim LEC Fund") to be combined with the SC USF at 2015 support levels. The Interim LEC Fund enabled incumbent local exchange carriers to lower access charges by providing a mechanism to offset the resulting loss of revenues. It was supposed to be a temporary fund until the SC USF was implemented.

The current total of the combined Interim LEC/SC USF and Lifeline payments is approximately \$41.6 million. Act 181 establishes a cap on the SC USF at \$40.7 million—2015 support amounts for carriers of last resort. The S.C. Department of Revenue will collect the SC USF fees from wireless providers and from prepaid wireless sellers at the point-of-sale. The earliest date that the changes can be implemented is January 1, 2017.

The Act also expands the base of contributors to the Dual Party Relay Fund which provides telephone access to persons who are hearing or speech impaired. The SC Office of Regulatory Staff who administers the program reported that the program was operating at a deficit due to the decline in landline revenues. The Act requires wireless providers, prepaid wireless sellers and VoIP providers to contribute. The DPRF fees will also be collected by the S.C. Department of Revenue. The Act reduces the cap on the DPRF fee from 25¢ to 10¢ per line per month. The current DPRF fee is 25¢. ORS estimates that the estimated new rate will be 6¢.

The Act also revised the Consumer Choice & Technology Investment Act of 2009 which allows a local exchange carrier to elect to be deregulated for most of its services. The electing carrier was required to continue offering "stand-alone" local service on a regulated basis to people who were receiving that type service on the date of the carrier's election. The Act sunsets the deregulation of the remaining stand-alone lines in 2020 for local exchange carriers such as AT&T who elected deregulation prior to January 1, 2016.

In order to implement the Act's changes in the Dual Party Relay Fund, the S.C. Office of Regulatory filed a petition with the S.C. Public Service Commission on June 17 seeking to reduce the DPRF charge from 25¢ to 6¢ per access line effective January 1, 2017. The petition also sought approval of a registration form for those

.... wireless carriers and VoIP providers who do not have a certificate of public convenience and necessity from the Commission and to approve the DPRF budget of \$4.1 million which remains the same. A hearing is scheduled for September 28, 2016.

The SC Office of Regulatory Staff also filed a petition on June 27th seeking approval to implement the changes in the SC USF resulting from Act 181 and Order No. 2016-22 which required wireless carriers to contribute to the SC USF. The SC USF Worksheet was revised and mailed to wireless carriers in early June. ORS intends to resize the USF and combine the Interim LEC Fund in the late summer or early fall so that billing under the new SC USF would begin January 1, 2017. To accomplish the transition, ORS seeks PSC approval (1) to modify the USF fund year to a calendar year, (2) to extend the current USF fund year by one month to adjust for the modification to a calendar year, (3) to shorten the current Interim LEC fund year by four months to adjust for a calendar year, and (4) to approve the annual support amounts to be disbursed to carriers of last resort. The support amounts are the same as 2015. A hearing on the petition is scheduled for October 18, 2016.

Act 181 also requires the SC Office of Regulatory Staff to report to the Public Utilities Review Committee within two years on the need for support and the appropriate level of support. Thereafter, a report will be submitted every four years.

Regulatory News

VoIP Contribution to SC USF

On July 8, 2016, the SC Telephone Coalition (“Coalition”) filed a petition seeking a ruling from the S.C. Public Service Commission declaring that all carriers who offer interconnected Voice over Internet Protocol (“VoIP”) services in South Carolina are required to contribute to the South Carolina Universal Service Fund (“SC USF”). The petition indicates that the Coalition is not seeking any expansion of the Commission’s jurisdiction over interconnected VoIP service or over any provider of such service. It states that for purposes of SC USF contributions only, VoIP service is functionally equivalent to voice service provided by telecommunications service providers. It also contended that interconnected VoIP service being offered by carriers who have obtained a certificate from the Commission is the same service currently being provided by interconnected VoIP service providers operating without certificates.

The SC Cable Television Association filed a petition to intervene in the proceeding on August 2nd. The SCCTA petition supported the request by the Coalition that the Commission make the determination that carriers who offer Interconnected VoIP services in this State should contribute to the SC USF. The SCCTA petition agreed with the Coalition’s statement that the relief requested in this proceeding does not seek any expansion of the Commission’s jurisdiction over Interconnected VoIP services. SCCTA also indicated that the relief requested in the Coalition’s petition will not affect the Commission’s jurisdiction or authority over broadband services. A hearing on the petition is scheduled for November 29, 2016.

Public Service Commission Elections

All of the new candidates for Commission Seats open for election on the Public Service Commission of South Carolina (“Commission”) withdrew prior to the May 25th election by the S.C. General Assembly. As a result all four incumbent Commissioners were reelected by acclamation: District 1 - John E. “Butch” Howard of Moncks Corner; District 3 - Cromer H. “Randy” Randall, III of Clinton; District 5 - Swain E. Whitfield of Winnsboro; and District 7 - G. O’Neal Hamilton of Bennettsville. Commissioner Whitfield was sworn in as Chairman and Commissioner Randall as Vice-Chairman on June 29th.

Update on PSC Wireless Docket

The Public Service Commission issued its order addressing wireless-wireline competition on January 26, 2016. *Petition of the SC Telephone Coalition for a Determination that Wireless Carriers are Providing Radio-Based Local Exchange Services in SC that Compete with Local Telecommunications Services Provided in the State*, SC PSC Docket No. 2015-290-C, Order No. 2016-22, dated January 26, 2016. The decision means that payments into the SC USF will now be fairly distributed between wireless and wireline carriers. The Commission concluded that overwhelming evidence shows that wireless providers are competing with wireline providers for local service. As a result, wireless carriers are required to contribute to the SC USF in the same manner that other telecommunication service providers contribute. CTIA-The Wireless Association appealed the decision to the South Carolina Court of Appeals and then withdrew its appeal in late May.

COMCAST AND THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT COLLABORATE TO CLOSE THE DIGITAL DIVIDE FOR UP TO 2 MILLION HUD-ASSISTED HOUSEHOLDS IN MAJOR INTERNET ESSENTIALS PROGRAM EXPANSION

PHILADELPHIA (July 15, 2016) — Today, Comcast and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) [ConnectHome](#) initiative took an historic step to close the digital divide in America. Now, public housing and HUD-assisted residents living in Comcast's service area are eligible to apply for [Internet Essentials](#), the company's high-speed internet adoption program for low-income families. Including homes covered by Comcast's pilot public housing expansion announced in March, an estimated total of up to 2 million HUD-assisted homes, including Public Housing, Housing Choice Voucher, and Multifamily programs, will now have access to low-cost internet service.

"ConnectHome is opening doors of opportunity for our next generation of Americans," said HUD Secretary, Julián Castro. "Today's announcement has the potential to transform the lives of hundreds of thousands of kids across the nation by giving them the tools to reach their full potential. We're grateful to Comcast for joining the ConnectHome initiative, which has extended its reach to more than 1.5 million children in one short year."

"This announcement reaffirms Comcast's determination to make a meaningful impact to close the digital divide for low-income families in this country," said David L. Cohen, Senior Executive Vice President and Chief Diversity Officer of Comcast. "This is the single largest expansion of the Internet Essentials program in its history, and we're thrilled to be working with HUD to help connect even more families, including seniors, veterans, and adults without children, to the transformative power of having internet service at home." **These numbers are for all HUD-assisted homes of which approximately 35 percent have school-aged children and are, therefore, already eligible to apply for Internet Essentials. These numbers also include households covered by Comcast's public housing pilot announced in March.*

Between 2009 and 2014, broadband service providers spent over \$422 billion on capital investments, and three in four American households now use broadband at home. Despite this significant progress, one in four American households still don't access the internet at home, particularly lower-income families with children. According to the 2013 American Community Survey, less than 43 percent of individuals without a high school diploma or equivalent lack home internet access, but under this opportunity adults and young learners can get connected from the comfort of their own homes and take advantage of resources to get a GED credential, apply for and complete college, and acquire the necessary digital literacy skills to thrive in a highly competitive, global workforce. ConnectHome strives to ensure students can access the same level of high-speed Internet at home that they have in their classrooms. Today's announcement furthers this vision, benefiting students of all ages.

This is the ninth time in five years Comcast has expanded eligibility for Internet Essentials. The policy change marks the first time, nationally, households without children eligible to participate in the National School Lunch Program are officially able to apply for Internet Essentials. ... to families with children eligible to receive a free school lunch from the National School Lunch Program. It was expanded, in 2012, to children eligible for the reduced price school lunch program. In 2013, Comcast expanded eligibility to include families with children in parochial, private, charter, and cyber schools, as well as students who are home schooled. Last year, Comcast extended the program two more times, on a pilot basis, to low-income seniors and low-income community college students. Earlier this year, another pilot program extended Internet Essentials to those living in public housing in Miami, Nashville, Philadelphia, and Seattle. Finally, Comcast has expanded the number of schools where every student in the school will be deemed eligible for the program so long as a certain percentage of the kids in that school are NSLP eligible – from 70 percent, to 50 percent, and now to 40 percent. As a result, Comcast estimates auto-enrollment now applies to about half of the 48,000 schools across its service area.

From August 2011 through December 2015, Internet Essentials has connected more than 600,000 low-income families, benefitting more than 2.4 million Americans, to the internet at home. Also since 2011, Comcast has invested more than \$280 million in cash and in-kind support to help fund digital literacy training and education initiatives, reaching nearly 4.4 million people through national and local nonprofit community partners.

- Provided more than 47,000 subsidized computers at less than \$150 each.
- Distributed for free nearly 51 million Internet Essentials program materials.
- Broadcast more than 8.3 million public service announcements, valued at more than \$100 million.
- Welcomed 5 million visitors to the Internet Essentials websites in English and Spanish and its Online Learning Center.
- Fielded more than 3.9 million phone calls to our Internet Essentials call center.
- Made Internet Essentials available in nearly 48,000 schools in more than 5,000 school districts, in 39 states and the District of Columbia.
- Partnered with 9,000 community-based organizations, government agencies, and federal, state, and local elected officials to spread the word.

Building on the Obama Administration's goal to expand high speed broadband to all Americans, in July 2015, President Obama and HUD Secretary Julián Castro announced [ConnectHome](#), an initiative to extend affordable broadband access to families living in HUD-assisted housing. Through ConnectHome, internet service providers, non-profits and the private sector are offering broadband access, technical training, digital literacy programs, and devices for residents in assisted housing units in 28 pilot communities across the nation. ConnectHome creates a platform to help ensure that students have access to high-speed internet for studying and doing their homework at home, as well as in school.

Comcast Recorded 445.8 Petabytes on Wi-Fi Network Last Year

During a panel discussion at the INTX show in May, Cole Reinwand indicated that Comcast recorded 445.8 million GB of traffic on its XFINITY Wi-Fi network in 2015. This is a dramatic increase from 2014 with 74.8 million GB, and 6.9 million GB in 2013. Reinwand also stated that their Wi-Fi users engage in an average 150 sessions per month and connect with an average two devices per person. Based on Cisco's traffic estimates, Comcast had roughly 9% of all the mobile data traffic offloaded to Wi-Fi networks in 2015 in the U.S. The Company operates 500,000 public Wi-Fi hotspots in the U.S. with its XFINITY brand.

Comcast also announced in May that it was teaming with Ericsson to deploy customized Fort Transit 350 cargo vans outfitted with Wi-Fi access points to provide XFINITY services at community activities, sporting events and emergency response initiatives.

SOUTH CAROLINA LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The following bills of interest became law since the First Quarter Newsletter. All legislation being followed that did not pass will have to be re-filed in the next session in 2017.

Act 181 – Senate Bill 277 – State Telecom Equity in Funding Act

Act 184 – House Bill 3193 – Campaign Contributions

Act 199 – Senate Bill 267 – Shortened Legislative Session

Changes the mandatory date for adjournment of the General Assembly from the first Thursday in June to the second Thursday in May. http://www.scstatehouse.gov/sess121_2015-2016/bills/267.htm

Act 244 – House Bill 5040 – Consumer Protection Code

Act 260 – Senate Bill 908 – SC Uniform Fiduciary Access to Digital Assets Act

Establishes a framework by which Internet users have the power to plan for the management and disposition of digital assets upon death or incapacitation. Act 282 – House Bill 3184 -Ethics Reform

Act 283 – House Bill 3186 – Ethics Reform

FCC BRIEFS

On May 25, 2016, the FCC proposed eliminating 2 public inspection file requirements that required commercial TV and radio broadcast stations to retain and make available copies of correspondence from views and cable operators to maintain and allow public inspection of the location of a cable system's principal headend. (FCC 16-62)

On May 25, 2016, the FCC issued a Report and Order establishing rules to implement a competitive bidding process for Phase II of the Connect America Fund to expand broadband in targeted rural areas. (FCC 16-64).

On May 25, 2016, the FCC proposed updates to its communications network outage reporting requirements so the agency can maintain awareness of network disruptions and promote and promote reliable communications. (FCC 16-63)

On May 6, 2016, the FCC issued its 17th Report Annual Assessment of the Status of Competition in the Market for Delivery of Video Programming. The most significant trends since the last report include the continuing development and consumer usage of time and location shifted viewing of video programming, the expansion of digital and high definition programming, and the progress of the online video industry. (DA 16-510)

On April 28, 2016, FCC approved a proposal to use real-time text to ensure that people with disabilities who rely on text to communicate have accessible and effective telephone access. (FCC 16-53).

On April 28, 2016, the FCC seeks comments on a framework to advance competition in the business

data services market. The item includes an order resolving an investigation of existing special access tariffs filed by AT&T, Verizon, CenturyLink and Frontier. The order found certain terms and conditions unjust and unreasonable and had the effect of decreasing facilities-based competition and inhibiting the transition to new technologies. (FCC 16-54).

On April 4, 2016, the FCC announced new broadband labels to provide consumers of mobile and fixed broadband Internet service with easy-to-understand information about price and performance.

On March 31, 2016, the FCC adopted a NPRM that recommends updating its video description rules to expand the availability of video described programming which makes video accessible to individuals who are blind or visually impaired by enabling audio-narration to describe key visual elements during pauses in dialogue. (FCC 16-37)

On March 31, 2016, the FCC reformed the Lifeline program to help low income consumers afford access to the Internet. Lifeline will support stand-alone broadband service and bundled voice and data service packages. (FCC 16-38)

On March 31, 2016, the FCC adopted a NPRM that proposes to establish privacy guidelines for broadband Internet Service Providers. The proposal is designed to ensure that customers have meaningful choice, greater transparency and strong security protections for their personal information collected by ISPs. (16-106)
